The terms Chant donné and Basse donné indicate written ha conservatoires. Students must supply the row rappers to go ver prescribed bass prescribed bass.

This example, from 1949, is not a student exercise but Duruflé's contribution to Soixante Quatre Leçons d'Harmonie, an anthology dedicated to Jean Gallon (1878-1959), the composer's harmony teacher at the Paris Conservatoire. The collection was published by Durand of Paris in 1953, consisting of the tributes of Gallon's pupils who won the Premier Prix d'Harmonie between 1919 and 1948.

Sixty-one composers are represented, among them Messian tragically short-lived organist Jeanne Da

The pieces appear th C clefs for all but the bass, and for unspecified forces, although one suspects wordless chorus.

Tempo and registration are editorial; Duruflé's dynamics have been left in their original positions, but some might be difficult to reproduce in organ transcription when both feet are otherwise engaged.

The work may be played in any of four ways:

- Nut. ONLY 1. Both hands on soft 8' flute
- 2. Right hand on
- 3. Solo to the leginning of bar 14, then both hands on flute and strings.
- 4. Both hands on flute and strings to the beginning of bar 14 then right hand solo to the end.
